St. Charles Utility Rates

Due to the City's need to accommodate significant capital projects as well as the increased cost of serving our customers, the utility rates for the City of St. Charles' electric, water, and sewer will increase starting with the bills mailed June 25, 2009. Electric rates will increase by 6%, and water and sewer rates will increase by 3%. A link to the City of St. Charles' utility rates is available on-line at www.stcharlesil.gov/ubills/.

The summer water rates are in effect for five months, and the summer electric rates are in effect for four months.

Landscape Grants Available

Does your business or property front Main Street (Rt. 64), Kirk Road or Randall Road? Would you like to improve the curb appeal of your property to enhance your business? If so, you may be eligible for one of the three landscape grant programs offered by the City of St. Charles through its Corridor Improvement Program. Through these grants, the City encourages and assists owners of highly visible properties (non-residential) to make landscape improvements to enhance the physical appearance and the overall economic vitality and character of both the properties and the City, along the City's most public auto and pedestrian corridors.

The Program features three types of grants: Corridor Grants, Downtown Grants, and Four Season Grants (which are intended for smaller projects, up to \$1000). Grilling Safety

- *BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- *The grill should be placed well away from the home, decks, railings, out from under eaves, overhanging branches, or other combustible material.
- *Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- *Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- *Never leave your grill unattended.
- *BBQ grills shall not be used on combustible balconies or within 10 feet of combustible construction in multi-family dwellings.
- *If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and if there is no flame, turn off the gas tank and grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

Nationally, Fire departments respond to an average of 7,900 home fires involving grills, hibachis or barbecues each year, including 5,000 outside fires and 2,900 structure fires. June and July are the peak months for grill fires. Thirty-three percent (33%) of home grill structure fires start on an exterior balcony or unenclosed porch.

1st Avenue Closure

Construction on N. 1st Avenue will began on Monday, June 15. Phase 1 construction will include N. 1st Avenue from just south of Cedar Avenue to State Avenue. N. 1st Avenue will be opened to the Checkerboard Square parking lot only. Access to the Municipal Building parking lots, the Police Station, and the lot north of Century Station will be from State Avenue only. Phase 1 is expected to continue until July 27.

Phase 2 construction will commence July 27 and will include the State Avenue intersection only. Access to the Municipal Building parking lots and the Police Station will be from Cedar Avenue. Access to the lot north of Century Station could be impacted by this construction.

Change to Refuse Fees

In response to declining revenue and a strong desire to maintain a high level of city services, the City of St. Charles reviewed several options regarding how to fund the 2009 Spring Clean Up program. The options considered ranged from raising the cost of refuse stickers to eliminating the program altogether. On June 1st, the City Council approved a small increase to the 2009/2010-refuse sticker, refuse bag, and toter fees as a means of funding the program for this year only.

Refuse and yardwaste rates are increased annually every July as dictated in the current refuse contract with Veolia. The fees specified below represent the rates that will be charged as a result of the contractual increase and the Spring Clean Up cost.

Summer Means those Pesky Mosquitos!

The objective of the City’s mosquito control (abatement) program is to control nuisance mosquitoes, reduce the potential of mosquito-borne disease transmission, and provide a comfortable and healthy atmosphere for residents. The City contracts with Clarke Environmental Mosquito Management, Inc., for the abatement program. Summer Storm Flooding Prevention

The Public Works Division suggest taking precautions to avoid storm flooding, here are just a few.

*Be sure gutters and down spouts are clean. Install extensions on down spouts to help drain water away from the building foundation.

*Keep trees and bushes trimmed away from the house so when they blow in the wind, they don’t cause wear on the roof, siding or trim. Keeping trees and bushes trimmed improves airflow and can help prevent moisture problems.

NOTE: NEVER DEPOSIT ANY LIQUIDS INTO STREET DRAINS OR CURB LINES AS STORM INLETS ALL DRAIN DIRECTLY TO THE RIVER.

Tips for Your Home, Inside and Out

Siding on Vintage Homes

Over the years, many older wood-sided structures have been “sided” or covered over with various synthetic materials, including aluminum, hardboard, asphalt and vinyl. The use of synthetic siding is intended to cut down on maintenance required for wood siding. However, synthetic siding can hide significant problems that may go undetected for years. Some of the most serious issues are rotting of structure elements (framing), insect infestations (termites), and moisture issues (mold). Loss of original architectural details also occurs (corner boards, ornamentation, window trim).

If you are lucky enough to have a home with its original siding intact, you may want to consider removing the “newer” siding, and refinishing the clapboard underneath it. Underneath the newer siding, you may find “ghosts” or “shadowing” of detailing, gutters, railings, or other decorative additions that have been lost, but can be replicated. You will gain new appreciation for your older home!

Guidelines for Draining Pools

Your swimming pool is filled with chlorinated water. Chlorinated water discharged directly to surface water (wetlands, lakes, streams, and rivers), roadways or storm sewers has an adverse impact on local water quality. High concentrations of chlorine, as are present in swimming pools, are toxic to wildlife and fish. Appropriate preparations should be made prior to draining. This can be done through mechanical or chemical means using the following guidelines:

- 1) Allow pool water to sit at least 2 days while receiving a reasonable amount of sunlight, and without further addition of chlorine or bromine. It is recommended that the chlorine level be tested after 2 days to ensure that safe levels are met (below 0.1 mg/l).
- 2) Pool discharge should be directed across your lawn, not down your driveway or into nearby storm sewer inlets. Our storm sewer system leads directly to wetlands, streams, lakes or rivers. These recommendations are based on guidance from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

Searching for Kit Homes in St. Charles

The Historic Preservation Commission is seeking information on the existence of “kit” houses purchased through catalogues and constructed in the older neighborhoods in St. Charles. At the turn of last century and into the late 1930s, “kit” homes were sold by companies with names such as “Montgomery Ward”, “Sears”, and “Aladdin.”

Very few records exist for the sales of these homes in St. Charles. There are books and catalogues available, but they may be difficult to find. The Historic Preservation Commission is compiling a local list and supporting documentation of known or potential “kit” houses, and is asking for assistance from the community. The Commission will be sending out letters to owners of potential “kit” homes to see if they have any information or evidence to offer. Give Your Appliances a Vacation

Your home uses too much electricity—even while you’re away on vacation. Televisions, VCRs, clock radios, microwave ovens and computers use energy if they’re plugged in—even if they’re turned off. So unplug them before you leave for a trip.

- Turn up the temperature on your air conditioner thermostat before you leave for vacation. There’s no need to cool the air much when nobody’s at home, but a house that’s too hot can invite mold.
- Switch your water heater to “low” or turn it off at the circuit panel. When you get home, it will take about three hours to heat water for a shower.
- Remove perishables from your refrigerator and turn it up a few degrees.
- Connect a few lights to timers to deter thieves and turn the rest off.

2009 50/50 Parkway Tree Program

The City is again offering trees for planting in the parkways through its **“50/50 Parkway Tree Planting Program.”** The City’s tree consultant will plant, mulch and provide a gator bag to assist with watering needs of the tree. Trees will be planted in late October/early November. Each tree delivered is balled and burlaped with average size being 2 1/2” in diameter. Species may vary upon availability. Each tree is covered by a one-year warranty

Japanese Lilac \$150.00

Mature height: 20-30 feet, mature width: 15-20 feet – grows with pronounced vigor, blooms mid-summer producing white flowers.

Autumn Blaze Maple \$150.00

Height: 65 feet – Green foliage with a red cast in summer, yellow with a red margin in fall.

Greenspire Linden \$150.00

Height: 40 feet, spacing: 35 feet – Light green leaves with showy yellow fall color.

Prairiefire Crabapple \$110.00

Mature height: 20 feet, leaves deep red-purple when young and mature to dark green; favorite of songbirds.

State Street Maple \$150.00

Mature height: 60 feet, mature 50 foot spread at base, excellent branching character, clean foliage and good yellow fall color; superior heat/drought tolerance.

Triumph Elm \$150.00

Mature height: 50-60 feet, mature width: 40-50 feet, excellent shade tree; large, lustrous, dark green foliage in summer and yellow fall color. Wonderful park or street tree.

City Tree Management

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) has been found in all areas of the City. The City Forestry division continues to inspect city ash trees and remove and replace infested trees as necessary. Residents who have an ash tree on the city parkway adjacent to their home have received a letter that included the City’s plan for identifying and marking infested trees, possible treatment of trees, and the removal and replacement of trees. Residents also received information regarding the biology of the EAB, characteristics of ash trees, and the signs and symptoms to look for, and discusses possible chemical treatments.

Even Trees Get Thirsty!

Trees grow best when soils are moist to a depth of six inches. As a rule of thumb, it takes one inch of water to wet six inches of soil. Most of our soils have a lot of clay so they are very slow to absorb water (0.1 to 0.25 inches per hour). Contrary to popular belief, running the sprinkler system on your lawn won’t give your trees the water they need. It’s best to take a drip or soaker hose and coil it under the dripline of the tree. Turn the hose on in the morning and let it run for 5-6 hours.

What is CPTED?

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design or CPTED is the proper design and effective use of the built environment that can lead to a reduction in the fear of crime an improvement in the quality of life.

Environment is defined as people and their physical and social surroundings. Design is defined as physical, social management, and law enforcement directives as people interact with their environment. CPTED emphasizes physical environment, behavior of people, productive use of space, and crime/loss prevention.
